2. Which sentence from the passage shows that the macaws do more than just eat fruit?

The passage states, "These bright birds ate fruit and spread seeds across the jungle floor," which shows that macaws also help new trees grow by spreading seeds.

VOCABULARY

3. What does the word camouflage mean as it is used in this passage?

In this passage, camouflage means the way an animal's color or pattern helps it blend in with its surroundings so it cannot easily be seen, just as the jaguar's spotted coat helped it hide in the shadows.

INFERENCE

4. Why do you think Leo wrote every detail in his notebook after watching the jaguar?

Leo likely wrote everything down because he understood that the jaguar's hunting method was an important example of how animals survive, and he did not want to forget what he was learning about the jungle.

CAUSE AND EFFECT

5. What would happen to the jungle if the macaws disappeared, according to the passage?

Because the macaws spread seeds across the jungle floor, if they disappeared, new trees could never grow, which would cause the jungle to become less healthy over time.

6. What sentence from the leaf-cutter ant paragraph shows that working together is more powerful than working alone?

The passage states, "Together, they moved more than any single ant could carry alone," which proves that teamwork and cooperation allow the ants to accomplish far more than one ant ever could.
